## Message from the Town Council



The new year brings a host of exciting improvements across Danville as we begin 2026 with renewed energy, enhanced recreation, and expanded opportunities to enjoy the community we call home.

One of the Town's most popular parks, Diablo Vista Park, or "Snake Park," has reopened its fully redesigned playground. A ribbon-cutting in late November brought families from across Danville to explore the upgrades, which include new interactive musical features, expanded picnic areas, and an outdoor fitness station (Page 6).

Work continues on projects that strengthen walkability and outdoor access, including the Diablo Road Trail (Page 7) and other pathway enhancements that will make it easier and safer to connect with parks, schools, and neighborhoods throughout Town (Page 8).

## GET YOUR DOWNTOWN EMPLOYEE PARKING PERMIT

The annual Downtown Employee Parking Permit program addresses a common issue for Downtown businesses: How to provide employees with nearby parking for their shifts without violating short-term parking restrictions meant to accommodate customers? The program offers low-fee annual parking passes for employees to park in certain nearby zones beyond the short-term parking window.

The program divides available permit parking into three zones, with a two-tiered fee structure. Zone 1 is more central to Downtown, and zones 2 and 3 are areas further east and north. Employee parking permits are \$50 for zones 2 and 3, and \$25 for zone 1. The annual fee allows employees to get to work without having to worry about short-term parking, and frees up parking for customers.

With this intention, the Danville Police Department requires proof of employment when purchasing a Downtown employee parking permit. The permit is a sticker that can be purchased online and must be affixed to the employee's windshield. News briefs from the Town of Danville



## CREEK MAINTENANCE

While the Town maintains some creeks, most in Danville fall under the responsibility of private homeowners, homeowner associations, or the Contra Costa County Flood Control District. For many creekside properties, the property line extends into the creek, making regular upkeep a homeowner's duty. Proper creek maintenance — such as clearing debris, trimming vegetation, and inspecting retaining walls — helps prevent blockages and protect the community. ## WINTER MORATORIUM

Cold weather doesn't slow down Danville's Maintenance Services team, who work through the winter months to keep Town parks and facilities in excellent condition. During the annual winter moratorium from December through February, staff focus on irrigation systems, repairs, and routine maintenance while the dog park and natural grass sports fields are closed. The Canine Corral will be closed through March 1, 2026, and is scheduled to reopen March 2, 2026, weather permitting. To learn more, visit [danville.ca.gov/fields](http://danville.ca.gov/fields).

## SIDEWALK TALK

With the rainy season upon us, now is a great time for homeowners to check the condition of the sidewalks adjacent to their property. Well-maintained sidewalks help keep our neighborhoods safe, accessible, and attractive for everyone. Homeowners are responsible for repairs such as smoothing uneven areas or fixing cracks that may develop over time. Taking care of these issues not only helps prevent accidents but also supports walkability throughout our community. ## SANDBAGS

The Town has restocked its sandbag station to help residents prepare for the rainy season and protect their properties from potential flooding. Located in the parking lot of the Town Service Center at 1000 Sherburne Hills Road, the self-service station provides sand, sandbags, and shovels for residents to fill their own bags. Each household may take up to 20 sandbags to ensure supplies remain available throughout the season. The station will stay open until spring, when the risk of heavy rain subsides. ## A Celebration of Indian-American Art Opens at the Village Theatre Art Gallery


The Village Theatre Art Gallery opens the new year with a powerful exhibition celebrating the voices and visions of Indian American artists from across the United States. *One Voice: Many Visions*, presented by the Indian American Artists Association (IAAA), brings together creators whose work explores heritage, identity, and the connections that bridge cultures. The exhibition will run from January 29 through March 27, with an opening reception on January 29 from 5 to 7 p.m.

IAAA is a collective of artists of Indian origin whose work blends traditions, memories, and inspirations, bridging the worlds of East and West, past and present. Their work offers viewers a dynamic look at what it means to belong to more than one place at once.

Visitors will encounter paintings rich with the hues and textures of India and mixed-media works inspired by ancient scriptures, contemporary life, or the space where the two meet. Some pieces honor cultural roots, while others push boldly into modern expression. Together, they form a collective narrative of balance, renewal, and the universal language of creativity.

What began as a summer renovation project at Diablo Vista Park has blossomed into a renewed gathering place that reflects the spirit of the Danville community. After months of transformation, one of the Town's most beloved parks has welcomed the community back with vibrant new features and a renewed sense of place.

The redesigned playground offers something for everyone, blending contemporary, nature-themed materials with innovative play equipment to spark creativity and adventure. Kids can climb, swing, and explore musical play features, while toddlers enjoy inclusive, accessible structures designed just for them. The layout maintains the park's original footprint while introducing shaded seating areas, game tables, and picnic spots that invite families to connect.

The updates extend beyond the play area, too. New exercise stations and refreshed landscaping that preserve the park's natural surroundings and views of the rolling hills create a welcoming, vibrant environment that encourages

movement and connection. Every detail, from a seat wall offering scenic views, and a drinking fountain equipped with a bottle filler and pet bowl, make the space feel both functional and inviting.

Of course, no visit to Diablo Vista Park would be complete without seeing its most iconic resident — the “Large Serpent – Scarlatti.” Created by Bay Area artist Peter Veres, the colorful sculpture has enchanted generations since it first slithered into the park in 1990. In fact, its playful presence is so beloved that it inspired the park's affectionate nickname, “Snake Park.” As part of the renovation, the serpent was carefully restored to honor the artist's original craftsmanship and ensure that its colorful scales continue to spark imagination for years to come.

Whether you're stopping by for a family outing, a stroll with friends, or a quiet moment in the sunshine, Diablo Vista Park is once again a place where memories are made.

# Decades in the Making:

## DIABLO ROAD TRAIL PROJECT MOVES FROM VISION TO REALITY

One of Danville's longest-awaited projects is beginning to take shape! In late October, the Town officially broke ground on the Diablo Road Trail, a new 0.9-mile segment that will complete more than two miles of an 8-foot-wide paved walking and biking trail along Diablo Road. This new connection links Green Valley Road to Blackhawk Road and offers a new gateway to Mount Diablo State Park.

Backed by a transformative investment of more than \$7 million, the trail is more than just a scenic path. It features key safety enhancements, including a High Intensity Activated Crosswalk (HAWK) at Fairway Drive to connect with the existing Barbara Hale Trail, and a physical barrier that separates cyclists

and pedestrians from vehicle traffic. Environmental upgrades — including creek bank stabilization, new fencing, new plants, native trees, and drainage improvements — will help preserve the area's natural environment and ensure the trail's durability for generations to come.

For Danville and its residents, the Diablo Road Trail represents years of careful planning, collaboration, and persistence. The groundbreaking ceremony brought together Town representatives, regional partners, and community members to celebrate the start of a long-envisioned initiative that will enhance safety and strengthen connections between neighborhoods, parks, and open spaces. Construction is underway and expected

# Safer Crossings Ahead:

ENHANCING WALKABILITY & COMMUNITY SAFETY IN DANVILLE

Over the next several months, new crosswalk enhancements and trail upgrades will make it easier and safer for residents, students, and visitors to move through Danville with greater confidence and ease.

As part of a capital improvement project focused on pedestrian safety, seven mid-segment road crossings will soon feature Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons, or RRFBs: bright amber lights that alert drivers when someone is crossing. The new beacons, activated by push-button or motion sensors, provide a clear visual signal that significantly improves visibility for nearby drivers. National studies show that RRFBs can reduce pedestrian crashes by nearly 50%.


Five of the new RRFBs will be installed at Iron Horse Trail crossings along Love Lane, West Linda Mesa Avenue, Del

Amigo Road, Hartford Road, and West Prospect Avenue. Two additional beacons will be added near both San Ramon Valley High School, at Railroad Avenue and Love Lane, and Monte Vista High School, at Stone Valley Road and Monte Sereno Drive.

A separate capital improvement project will deliver further upgrades to Iron Horse Trail crossings. These enhancements include new raised crosswalks, upgraded pavement markings, high-visibility signage, and drainage improvements at Paraiso Drive, El Capitan Drive, and Greenbrook Drive. Construction is set to begin in spring, and is expected to be completed by fall.

Once these installations are complete, all Iron Horse Trail crossings within Danville will be equipped with either RRFBs or full traffic signals, marking

a major milestone in the Town's ongoing commitment to public safety. Learn more about these projects at [danville.ca.gov/transportation](http://danville.ca.gov/transportation).

## NEW PUBLIC ART EXHIBITION:

# 'Acorns of the Old Oak' Sprouts Up in Danville



Most people in Danville know the Town's link to oak trees, from our Town mascot, Auggie the Acorn, to our beloved Old Oak Tree of more than 350 years. So when the Recreation, Arts & Community Services team was considering its first permanent public art exhibition, acorns were a natural choice.

Introducing *Acorns of the Old Oak*, a collection of 10 bronze acorns placed in key locations in Downtown Danville. The acorns were cast by Redlands artist Chad La Fever, selected through an open call for artists qualifications in spring 2025. La Fever's works were also featured in the fall Village Theatre Art Gallery exhibition, *Melded Metals*. Each acorn is about the size of a softball.

The acorns have been installed in public spaces, in both clearly visible and slightly hidden locations. Through January 31, the community is invited to preview the acorns and participate in a naming contest. Much like our mascot acorn, each acorn will have a story created to bring them to life, once each mini statue is named.

Once the acorns are properly named, visitors will be able to use a map to learn more about each acorn, and follow clues to find them. There will also be a coloring book and future story book about Auggie and his acorn friends.

Ask Assistant Town Manager and Maintenance Services Director Dave Casteel about his accomplishments and he will quickly turn to talking about his team. Since joining the Town of Danville in 2006, he says he's fortunate to work with people who genuinely care about what they do, and that his job is to "not get in the way of them doing what they're great at." But talk to nearly any Town employee, and you will get a different story: they'll tell you that Dave's steady leadership and behind-the-scenes support make all the difference.

Those who work with Dave say his no-nonsense style is balanced with a supportive and thoughtful approach. Since his early days with the Town as a Code Enforcement Officer and Assistant Planner, and through his roles overseeing Maintenance Services teams, Dave lets his team shine, but his own impact is easy to see. Last

year, he led a cross-functional team of staff and contractors to complete the Downtown Master Plan Catalyst Project, directly improving the safety, vibrancy, and small-town charm of the historic Downtown.

As Assistant Town Manager, his new role brings opportunity for even bigger impact as he brings collaboration, support, and even the occasional "dad joke" to the Town's second-in-command staff position. Working alongside Town Manager Tai Williams, Dave is excited about having a greater involvement in the direction of our Town.

"I think there is a lot of fulfillment in what we do," he says. "From responding to major storm events to the day-to-day things like collaborating with park visitors to improve their experiences, we have the unique opportunity to impact people's quality of life every single day."
